

VISIT TO HORHAM HALL There was a good turnout for the Group's visit on Sunday 17th May, 2015. Horham Hall is regarded as one of the finest pre-Reformation houses in Essex, and is steeped in a rich history. It stands astride two parishes, Thaxted and Broxted, and the boundary runs through the entrance porch and Great Hall. Parts of the house date back to the fifteenth century, but its current appearance is largely due to Sir John Cutte, Under-Treasurer to Henry VIII, who bought the estate in 1502. There was much to see in the house, including the bedroom where Elizabeth I stayed on her two visits to Horham Hall, in 1571 and 1578. The Great Hall, with its panelled ceiling and oriel window, was particularly impressive. We were made very welcome by the current owner, Mrs. Ward-Thomas, and all thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to explore the house and grounds. The weather was glorious on the day of our visit, and we were able to walk round the extensive garden, with its paved terrace, fountain court, and lake.



VISIT TO WARDEN ABBEY On Sunday 7th June, another visit took us to the site of Warden Abbey, near Old Warden in Bedfordshire. Warden Abbey was founded in 1135, and was a daughter house of Rievalux in Yorkshire; it established three daughter-houses of its own, at Sawtry, Sibton and Tilty. A modern stained-glass depiction of the arms of Warden Abbey can be seen in Tilty church. Nothing of the abbey remains now, but traces may be detected in the landscape, and local historians have collected together a great deal of information about it, together with an impressive collection of finds.
