

The shield on the town sign, for example, (near the Queen Victoria pub) incorporates colours or devices relating to seven Dunmow manors, and the reputed manor of Minchins. There are also allusions to the church, the town as a borough, and Catherine of Aragon (who was granted the manor of Great Dunmow in 1509). The walk included a coffee break at the Saracens, and lunch at Meadow Hill.
