GENERAL MEETINGS

There was an external speaker for our **MAY** meeting – Sarah-Joy Maddeaux, Sound Archivist at the Essex Record Office, who gave a talk entitled 'How to Speak Essex'. The presentation featured many historic recordings of Essex accents from the Essex Sound and Video Archive. Sarah-Joy provided some fascinating insights into the history and development of the Essex accent, and the items from the Archive were often entertaining as well as illustrative. As a follow-up to the meeting, Sarah-Joy sent round some links that might be of interest. The oldest recording of a genuine Essex speaker that she knew of is on the British Library's website; it was recorded in 1917, with a man from Latchingdon: https://sounds.bl.uk/Accents-and-dialects/Berliner-Lautarchiv-British-and-Commonwealth-recordings/021M-C1315X0001XX-0676V0 The man was asked to read a section from the Bible for the recording, so it is not natural

speech, but it is fascinating nonetheless. Sarah-Joy also sent instructions for accessing some of the Essex Record Office's recordings free on line (thanks to a recent Heritage Lottery Funded digitisation project). These are as follows:

Recordings can be found by searching our catalogue, Essex Archives Online: <u>https://www.essexarchivesonline.co.uk/</u> From the main search page, change the 'Refine your search' box to 'Audio Visual' and then type in a term that interests you, and this will limit your results to items where we have posted the audio or video online. You will need to create a log-in, but you will not need to pay any money.

At our **JULY** meeting, TALHG Members Darren Stone, Maggie Stevens and Alf Wright gave a presentation on the Countess of Warwick's Cottage Garden Show. This featured local newspaper reports, and various other sources, to chart the history of the original show, from 1885-1933, and the modern show, revived in 1990. The evening included numerous informative and entertaining stories and anecdotes, relating to the Countess and to the two versions of the Country Show.
